





Associated Recreation Council (ARC) revenue comes primarily from fees paid by participants in hundreds of programs delivered through 26 community centers and related facilities throughout Seattle - nearly all of which is used to directly support and administer those programs and facilities.

ARC and its 36 advisory councils raise additional support through fundraising events, grants, and generous contributions from dedicated individuals and businesses throughout our community. These funds allow us to offer program scholarships and improve service delivery, which ensures equitable access to high-quality programming for all Seattle residents.
